



HIGHLAND BEACH DEBRIS MANAGEMENT

HOW TO MANAGE YOUR DEBRIS

- ~ All storm related landscaping debris should be placed in a pile on your property's swale, which generally is the first five (5) to ten (10) feet of property adjacent to the roadway.
- ~ Tree debris such as branches and tree trunks should be cut into sections no longer than six (6) feet in length and piled neatly together.
- ~ You should contact one of your local landscape companies for assistance with cutting and bringing the larger landscaping material to the swale should you need help. Please ensure that any company that you hire is licensed and insured for your protection.
- ~ Bags of leaves and very small branches will not be picked up with the larger landscaping debris and should be placed in your trash container.
- ~ Any other storm related non-landscaping debris such as fencing, metal, roof material, etc. should also be brought to the swale and placed in a pile SEPARATE from the landscaping vegetation.
- ~ Under no circumstances should any garbage or BAGGED materials be mixed with the debris piles for they will **not** be picked up.

While residents are cleaning up tree and vegetative debris from their yards, swales, and walkways, they should make sure the piles do not impede the flow of traffic in the roadway or block pedestrian usage of the walk path.

There is no rush for residents to get all their storm debris to the curb. Debris collection vehicles will begin collecting debris later this week and will make multiple passes until all debris is picked up.

We urge all residents to be patient as collection efforts resume. It may be weeks before the first collection of vegetation and construction storm debris reaches everyone.
